What Profit Is There To Gain the World and Loose Your Soul (Pt 1) By Bill Beebe

Tom's lesson this morning will be based on a question asked by Jesus and recorded for us in Mark 8:36–37 (KJV 1900). There Jesus asks; "³⁶ For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? ³⁷ Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?"" We understand that there is a large profit involved with gaining a reputation in the world. Just look at the movie and TV stars and the profit that they have made. But just exactly what does Jesus mean by losing the soul? And what is the soul anyway?

These are questions that we have to answer before we can even attempt to answer the original question as proposed by Jesus. First of all we must understand that the idea of a human soul is not unique to the Bible. Archaeologist unearthed a stone slab dating to the eight century BC that claimed a persons soul inhabited the rock after his death and cremation.¹ Still other researchers trace the concept of a human soul back to the third millennium BC and the land of accent Egypt². Of course, those of us who believe that the Bible is historically correct will point out that the human soul was introduced into man when God formed Adam and breathed into his nostrils. That passage is Genesis 2:7 with a corresponding passage in the New Testament (1 Cor 15:45). So to us, the idea of the human soul predates all the other reverences, and it existed at the creation of man by God.

But what is it, and why did Jesus assign so much value to it? These are the major questions. Researching different definition of the soul, I ran across this definition: "Generally speaking, the human soul is the unphysical entity of the human being apart from the physical matter."³ The Bible mentions the word soul some 458 times. However the Hebrew word that is translated into English as "Soul" is actually used in excess of 780 times in the Old Testament. In addition to this, the Greek word that is translated as "Soul" in the New Testament is used 103 times. Complicating this is the fact that the translators of the King James Version of the Old Testament used 28 English words in translating the Hebrew word. Some of the things we can derive from the Bible are:

- The soul can refer to an individual (Ezek 18:20, 1 Peter 3:20)
- In some instances in the Bible it translated as life (Matt 2:20, Genesis 1:30)
- Still in other passages the word is used to refer to the intellectual and emotional nature of man (Genesis 27:25, Job 30:16)

The Bible, though, doesn't really define "Soul" but it has some passages that give

us a clearer insight as to what it is.

Jesus tells us in Matthew 10:28 that it is separate from the body and that it can not be killed. He also tells us that it is not the heart or mind of man, but that it is something that defines us (Matt 22:37). He goes on to tell us that the soul has emotions (Matt 26:38, Mk 12:20, John 12:27). Paul tells us in Romans 2:9 that the soul can do evil, then in Romans 13:1 he uses it to refer to individuals. In Hebrews 4:12 we learn that the soul and spirit of man are separate things. Still other passages tell us that the soul can be saved (Heb 10:19, James 5:20) and it can be required by God (Lk 12:20).

From these passages we learn that the soul is the thing that makes us who we are. That our souls are immortal, and that the soul feels emotions. We also see that the soul will continue after the death of our bodies. In the story of Lazarus and the Rich Man in Luke 16, the Jesus tells us that the essence of men continues after death and will either enter paradise or torment. Since the body of man dies and returns to dust (Gen 3:19) from which God originally made us, Jesus must be speaking of the soul of Lazarus and the Rich Man in this story. Because our souls will continue, and be recognizable (Luke 16:23) after death, it is the most valuable thing that exist. And this is why Jesus asked the question "What shall a man give in exchange for his soul?". It is a timeless question and one that each of us should consider today. After all our processions are distributed to others or just dumped when we die, what is the thing that will matter to us? It won't be the gold or diamonds we held so highly while we were alive, it won't be the fame we had...but it will be our souls that will either be in paradise or torment and eventually at judgement in Heaven or Hell for eternity. So, what will you give in exchange for your soul?
